## Overview

Orphanage Outreach is a 501-C-3 non-profit organization headquartered in Glendale, Arizona, and working at orphanages in the Dominican Republic.

Since 1994, nearly 4000 volunteers have joined Orphanage Outreach in the Dominican Republic. The majority of these volunteers are university students, from more than 140 different colleges and universities.

Organized alternative break teams from colleges such as Pepperdine University, Appalachian State University, Rice University, Western New England College, the University of Alabama-Birmingham, the University of Vermont, Penn State University, the University of South Carolina, DePauw University, Grove City College, Johnson Bible College, the University of Virginia, North Carolina State University, California Lutheran University, College of St. Benedict, Virginia Wesleyan College, Plymouth State University, Xavier University, and the University of Western Ontario have joined Orphanage Outreach in the Dominican Republic.

Volunteers live directly on the orphanage grounds, and work at the orphanage and in the local schools. The majority of their focus is on teaching—English, math, science, music, art, reading, drama, and more. Volunteers are also involved in orphanage work projects.

Orphanage Outreach volunteer programs are professionally managed by American and Canadian team leaders living at the orphanages.

## Volunteer Opportunities

### Alternative Breaks

Individuals and groups are invited to join Orphanage Outreach for fall, winter, spring, and summer alternative breaks. Volunteers will work as a team, tutoring the orphanage children in “learning lab”, teaching in the local schools, and working on various work projects at the orphanage.

### Internships

Internships of one or more months are available throughout the year. Interns work in their own area of interest tutoring at the orphanage or teaching in the school, and also help lead shorter term volunteers.

### Semester Abroad

Volunteers are invited to join us for the fall or spring semesters, tutoring at the orphanage or teaching in the local schools. Teachers in a variety of subjects are needed, including English, science, math, reading, drama, music, and art.
